 - Contracted services for treatment
 - ✓ CET, Inc: sex offender treatment.
 - ✓ Polygraph Associates provide polygraph services.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE



- 3 Parole/Probation Officers Supervise 119 Cases
- Release Officer-enforces “no contact” prior to sentencing
- Batterer’s Intervention Services provided by Klamath Youth Development Center (Contracted Services)

- 1 Officer
- Team supervision with Mental Health staff providing supervision, case management, and medication management.

CHILD WELFARE & FAMILY COURT



- 1 Officer
- Cases involved with DHS and Family Court
- Enhanced communication & reduction of duplicate services
- Improved client participation with both agencies

DRUG COURT

- 1 Officer
- Partnership with local Drug Court
- First time offenders offered treatment and services
- Successful completion of treatment allows for dismissal of conviction

JAIL-SANCTION BEDS

- Community Corrections funds 6 jail beds within the jail
- Beds for offenders sentenced to 12 months or less
- Local Control provides best use of local sanctioning resources

WORK CREWS & COMMUNITY SERVICE

- Alternative sanction
- Work Crews: Expected component of Community Corrections are not required and not specifically funded.

RE-ENTRY AND WORK RELEASE

36 BED MINIMUM SECURITY

- Dormitory style facility
- 24 Bed Work Release
- 12 ODOC Beds
 - Average 9-12 ODOC



RE-ENTRY SERVICES

- Assessment & Screening
- Substance abuse treatment
- Supervised job search
- Cognitive skills
- Transitional skills
- Educational
- Vocational
- Work Release
- Housing assistance



KLAMATH COUNTY RE-ENTRY PROGRAM

REACH-IN

- Corrections Counselor conducts reach-in services up to one year before release
- Identify offender risk and needs
- Schedule offender to transfer to Re-Entry Program up to 180 days before release to post prison supervision (PPS).

CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES

- Assessment (Criminogenic risk and needs)
- Create an evolving Transition Plan for each resident based on initial assessment and individual progress in program
- Provide a supportive environment to address barriers identified through assessment and case planning activities
- Group and individual counseling focused on criminogenic risk /needs, utilizing Moral Reconciliation Therapy curriculum and transitional skills curriculum.

RE-ENTRY PARTICIPATION

- 24 Engaged in Faith Based/Culture and Heritage Programming
- 26 Engaged in alcohol/drug treatment
- 14 Participated in Batterer's Intervention Program
- 20 Enrolled in Mental Health Services
- 13 Engaged in Family Counseling
- 15 Moral Reconciliation Therapy (MRT) participants

RE-ENTRY OUTCOMES

MARCH 2007 – SEPTEMBER 2010

- 73 participants
- 56 Successfully Completed
- 11 returned to ODOC
- 6 current residents

83.6% = (56 Successful clients ÷ (73 total participants – 6 active))
Successfully completed Re-Entry Program

RE-ENTRY SUCCESS

- 85.7% of those who successfully completed the program have remained felony conviction free
- 42 were employed or attending college upon release(75%)
- 56 were released to safe housing (100 %)

RE-ENTRY PROGRAM RECIDIVISM

- Overall Recidivism rate for those offenders completing the program and receiving a new felony conviction is 14.3% (8 of 56)
- Between 0 and 6 months of release:
 - ✓ 0 offenders convicted of a new felony
- Between 6 and 12 months of release:
 - ✓ 2 offender convicted of new felony
- Between 12 and 24 months of release:
 - ✓ 6 offenders convicted of new felony

WORK RELEASE

- ❖ 24 Work Release Beds
- ❖ Allows offenders to keep their job
- ❖ If unemployed, then completing supervised work crew
- ❖ Requires personal accountability
- ❖ Provides regimented schedule
- ❖ Sentenced and Sanctioned Offenders
- ❖ Average length of stay 10-20 days
- ❖ Allowed to continue with treatment services

THE LEAST EXPENSIVE, MOST EFFECTIVE CORRECTIONAL APPROACH

- Community Supervision costs \$9.95 per day
- One prison bed costs \$77.78 per day
- 34,000 people in Oregon under community supervision
- 7 out of 10 do not re-offend
